Journal Entry #4 Social Conflict

Second: Determine if the conflict is best described as being caused by something within the other person (Ex. they lied to you because they're dishonest) or by something external to the person (Ex. they lied because they had to in order to avoid getting in trouble with the police).

Attribution Theory: People generally attribute other's behaviors as arising from two sources: either from an internal disposition, or as a result of external circumstances.

For example Sydney's boyfriend is rude to her (he is angry and speaks in a gruff/mean tone of voice to her) just because she was late for picking him up to give him a ride to his basketball game. She may be angry with his behavior if she believes her boyfriend's behaviour is due to internal causes – perhaps he just does not really care how she feels.

Alternatively she may attribute the cause of his angry tone of voice to external causes - perhaps he just had a fight with his dad or is just having a bad day.

Behaviour that is thought to result from a person's internal disposition (personality) is an example of: <u>Dispositional Attribution</u> Behaviour that is thought to result from an outside event or circumstance is an example of: <u>Situational Attribution</u> <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=PJgTSgleIb8</u> Show first minute only
